For Michael Paul, the idea for a company which now turns over \$37 million a year came from a personal problem.

"I was trying to get a computer sent from Sydney to Melbourne. It was a two-day exercise to find someone to package it and send it," he says.

Realising there had to be a better way, he set out building the Pack & Send franchise. Twenty years later the chain has more than 100 service centres across Australia.

"We saw franchising as a way to replicate the success of our first

outlet, quickly," he says.

Paul believes building a successful franchise starts at the source. "You need to continually invest in making your business system stronger and more robust; that's what you bring to the table for others."

The franchise model also means his role as "boss" is interpreted in different ways by different people.

"As the founder and CEO we have a number of corporate stores, but we're also providing advice and guidance to another 100 managing directors." SUE WHITE
